

The rules contained in *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised - 11th Edition*, shall govern the Conference on all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with our Bylaws and Administrative Guidelines.

Although the Board of Directors, Counselors, Committee and Task Force Chairs, Liaisons, Regional Coordinators, FAWCO Foundation, FAUSA and all club participants have no voting rights, they may participate

fully in all Conference floor discussions.

Please wait to be recognized by the Chair, before speaking, and wait for the microphone. Before proceeding, state the name of your club and your name.

SEATING OF DELEGATES

Each club will have up to three seats allocated to them during the General Sessions. Additional club members may sit in the last few rows. The FAWCO Representative or other voting delegate will need to be one of the three sitting in their respective assigned area. Clubs will be sitting in alphabetical order beginning with row two, from left to right if facing the audience.

Speakers' Corner



Karla Bookman is an American citizen who has been living in India for the past eight years. She studied Art History and Philosophy at The University of Pennsylvania, and then received her graduate degree in law from Columbia University. Karla practiced law at a New York litigation firm, and after moving to India, worked in the legal outsourcing industry

in Mumbai for six years. She is now the founder and editor of a niche new media site called The Swaddle, which produces content for Indian parents.

Tara Ramaseshan is a public speaker, author, and amateur historian. She loves exploring connections between India's past and present, beginning with the ancient Indus Valley civilization that dates back some 6,000 years. Trained originally as a lab scientist, she took a MSc in Zoology and specialized in genetic engineering at University of Poona, then worked for two years at the Swedish pharmaceutical Astra Research Centre in India where she discovered her preference for working with people



rather than microscopes. She abandoned the lab to begin a decade-long career at Proctor & Gamble India and became an expert on consumer product development research, with studies on a diverse array of consumers at P&G sites around the world. An avid reader, Ms. Ramaseshan is the author of several educational books for children published originally in English and translated into five vernacular Indian languages. She lives in Mumbai with her family.



Jodie Sovak is the Head of Community Relations at The American School of Bombay. She moved to Mumbai, India 12 years ago with her husband. She now has two school-age daughters. Before moving to Mumbai, Jodie enjoyed 8 years working as a mathematics teacher in both public and private schools in the US. Montclair State University.


Registration Information

Registration for Conference Delegates and Guests starts on Wednesday, March 29. A special Registration Desk will be set up in the lobby of the Trident Hotel and will be open from 3:00-7:00 pm.

Top 5 Highlights from Past Spotlights

Please check past issues for restaurant recommendations, what to buy, local etiquette and many more interesting tips and useful information!



1. Money

- a. Be sure to advise banks and credit card companies that you are traveling to India to avoid unnecessary blocking of your card.
- b. Do change money at the airport for necessities, including tips, upon arrival.

- c. ATMs are generally available. Credit cards are widely accepted throughout India so your cash needs would be limited to tips and small purchases.
- d. The Trident can exchange your currency for Indian Rupees.

2. Plan your airport transfer on arrival ahead of time.

- a. Pre-paid taxi booked at counter before exiting the arrivals hall.
- b. Cox & Kings a driver will be waiting for you outside the arrivals hall and will take you to the hotel. This is booked and paid in advance.
- c. Trident Hotel a driver will be waiting for you outside the arrivals hall and will take you to the hotel. This will be billed to your room.

3. Staying Healthy and Happy in Mumbai


- a. Carry all prescription medicines in your handluggage in case of lost or delayed checked luggage.
- b. Please bring your preferred over-the-counter medications, such as Imodium, Advil, Tums or other medication for common conditions.
- c. You should carry hand sanitizer and tissues with you as clean water for hand washing and toilet paper is not always available when outside the hotel.
- d. The Trident has a doctor on call should you fall ill.

4. What to pack

- a. Generally you will find India a bit more casual than other countries but no less fashionable.
- b. When visiting local sights, it is best to avoid shorts, tight clothing and tank tops without a covering blouse or top.
- c. Walking shoes or flats for outside the hotel is preferable due to uneven pavements.
- d. Sunglasses, hats, sunscreen and mosquito repellent are important when sightseeing.
- e. The Trident offers quality laundry services with a 25% discount for delegates and guests.
- f. The hotel provides shampoo, conditioner and hair dryers.

5. Tips on Tipping

- a.10% is the norm for bars and restaurants.
- b. Porters/Bellboys: Average is Rs 50/bag and Rs100/bag if large or heavy.
- c. Taxis and Tuc-Tucs: usually round up to nearest Rs 50/100 keeping a tip between Rs 20-50 for local service.
- d. For pre-paid taxis 10% of the are.
- e. For Airport transfer where driver is waiting then Rs 200-400 per trip.



- Be sure you have a valid Tourist Visa and check that the dates are correct.
- The Immigration Hall will have 3 lines, be sure you are in the correct one. If traveling with a friend or family member and you have different types of visas, you



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will need to go to the specific line for your specific visa.

- E-Visas: please go to line specific for e-visas only. You will get your passport stamped with a proper visa. If they have a First/Business class line then be sure to have your boarding pass with you.
- Those with a traditional visa from a Consulate, Embassy or Visa Service Agency, your passport is already stamped so you go to the line for normal immigration. There is a First/Business Class line for traditional visas and you must have your boarding pass.
- If asked your purpose of visit, please do not mention CONFERENCE as we do not qualify under government rules as a conference and you could be rejected on arrival. Please say you are visiting India as a tourist.

 When you are finished with passport control, you will proceed to baggage claim. Once you have your luggage, you will, most likely, need to pass through baggage x-ray, then you are free to exit the arrivals hall.



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As a reminder, changing money and booking of a pre-paid taxi are done before exiting the arrivals hall.

For those that are being meet by the hotel or C&K airport transfer service, please exit the arrivals hall and look for your name on a sign.

And you are off to your hotel!
